The people in this field might delude themselves into thinking they're morally better than everyone else but based on what I've seen, many are a bunch of lazy phonies who want a comfortable life. Nonprofits attract good, naive lost souls and they also attract wolves in sheep's clothing looking to exploit these good people. There are also companies that fulfill project requirements sponsored by national governments.
